# Character Traits?

Traits are words that we use to describe the personality or qualities of a character.

Characters and can have physical traits or personality traits.

# Flat Character

- A character with few traits (not detailed)
- No complex emotions, motivations or personality.
- Does not go through any kind of change in the story.

# Round Character

- A well developed character that is important to the story.
- Main characters are often round.
- They have personality and different emotions, that can help us relate to them because they seem more realistic.
- Opposite to a flat character
- A round character does not have to undergo change



# Static Character

- A character that does not undergo any significant change throughout a story.
- The traits of this character does not change over time.
- Does not grow or develop.
- Are often supporting characters in a story.

# Dynamic Character

- A character that undergoes change during a story.
- The traits and emotions of this character change over time.
- Experiences growth.
- Most main characters are dynamic

# Protagonist

- The main character of the story
- Has some kind of goal
- Can be either good or bad
  
- One example is the character Shrek. Can you think of others?



# Antagonist

- The character, or the force, that is working against the main character.
- Someone or something that works against the main character.



Question: Who/what was the antagonist in *The Fun They Had*?



# Conflict

- Conflict can be either external or internal
- There are 3 main types of conflict, but a few others seen in some stories as well.

# External Conflict

- **Person versus Person**
  - A conflict between 2 or more individual characters.
- **Person versus Environment**
  - A conflict between a person and their situation (nature, society, the supernatural, technology)

# Internal Conflict

- Person versus Self
  - A struggle taking place inside a character's mind.

# Point of View - The viewpoint the story is told.

## 1. First Person:

- The narrators point of view
- Uses "I" when speaking.
- The readers know only as much as the narrator does.

## 2. Third Person Omniscient:

- All knowing — God Mode

The narrator knows the thoughts and feelings of all characters.

## 3. Third Person Limited Omniscient:

- The narrator knows thoughts and feelings of one character, but not necessarily the others.
- The narrator would talk about the actions, feelings, and thoughts of a specific character or characters.
